

## Message from Pastor Kim

### Prescription for Lent

Every human being's greatest need is the need for connection--with God and with other human beings. If we think of the most satisfying moments of our lives, the memories will likely involve being in the presence of those who love us. By the same token, our worst moments often involve times when we were cut off from family and friends, or cut off from God. Or times when we were facing a serious problem and felt alone. Why else would solitary confinement be such a horrible and dreaded form of punishment?

We human beings have such a need for togetherness and communion that it may seem like our entire lives turn into one long search for love. Why is this so? One reason may be that we are made in the image and likeness of God and GOD IS LOVE, GOD IS COMMUNION. God's image is writ large into our very natures, imprinted on our neurons, coded on our brain cells, and burned into our hearts. The apostle Paul says that God is love and that we are most God-like when we give love and receive love. You see, our hearts are made for one another and for God.

There is passage in the novel "Zorba the Greek," in which Zorba is speaking. He says, "One day when I was a child, an old man placed his hand on my head as though he was giving me a blessing. 'Alexis,' he said, 'I'm going to tell you a secret. You're too small to understand now, but you'll understand when you are bigger. Listen, little one. Neither the seven stories of heaven nor the seven stories of earth are enough to contain God, but a person's heart can contain God. So, be careful, Alexis, never to wound another person's heart.'"





## Trustees February Report

The January 6, 2016 trustee meeting began with the introduction of our **new members**; Myra Tesbir, Chuck Vietrogoski, Peter Hornik and Tom Rozanski. Our first order of business was **elections of 2016 officers**. Myra Tesbir to fill the position of treasurer. Larry Bornemeier was nominated to be President for 2016. Mary Lou Heyel was nominated to be the recording secretary.

**Update on column replacement:** The blueprints have been completed and Cenaxo is to submit the request for a permit. Upon permit acceptance the new column will be ordered. It will take several weeks for column manufacture. Upon completion the plan is for the column to be set in 1 day, after site preparation is done. The whole project will take several weeks after the setting of the column.

**Church Sign:** The discussion began with a discussion of our old sign. It was made as a memorial to Robert Litchfield. Because the city will only accept one sign it was decided that we look for an appropriate place on our property for this memorial. The recommendation was made to relocate the sign to the Prayer Garden.

**Cleaning Service:** After securing bids with other cleaning services it has been decided to retain our present cleaning service. We will also speak to them about making sure all the requirements for cleaning are clear to those who do the work. We are also continuing a contract with our lawn and snow plow service.

**Church Grounds Needs:** The Prayer Garden needs attention. We will address this early in the spring.

**Lock Up:** Larry distributed a clear outline of the Lock Up Procedure. When fine tuned there will be a permanent copy kept in the office . Larry will do this month.

**The date has been set— the first Saturday in October, from 10am to 4pm—Get it on your calendar!!**


The first organizational meeting has been held and ideas are flowing. Our 12th annual Festival will be Saturday, October 1, from 10am to 4pm.

We are looking for persons to be in charge of the following:


- ◆ A pumpkin festival chairperson or persons, Lucinda Johnson is willing to co-chair but cannot be the only chair



*The history...*

The sign did not just appear, as many of you who have been consulted and advised along the way are well aware. A new sign that increased awareness of our place of worship to those who drive by was one of the recommendations of the Dive team. As you may recall, the Dive team was a team put in place four years ago who met over a two-year time period to explore how to grow disciples in the Danbury area by 'diving' into the actions needed to reach this goal. Our end goal is to become a vital congregation and this new sign is a key part of our journey.

to everyone for their ideas of insights along the way as we agreed on our requirements, narrowed down the list of vendors, and chose the final design and colors and our vendor Sign-a-rama, a locally owned company. The many hours invested are truly appreciated! It was an iterative process as we refined our requirements, sought your feedback, secured the permit, scoped the work to fit the budget of \$9,000 (maximum), and negotiated the best value for our money.

The Recommendation team (Kim Goodwin, Tom & Lori Rozanski, and Coralee Demouth) wish to thank the Trustees, especially Larry Bornemeier, and Bev Anderson, Karlene and Don Lombardo, and the Finance committee, plus Chris Russock, Kathy Roig and Pastor Kim for their support through the process.

*We are all very thankful to Rosemarie Feeley for her generous memorial donation to the church that allowed us to create this outward message to our community. We will honor Rosemarie and her gift in the garden that will surround the sign.*

*What's next for the sign?*

We are not quite done. We will paint the back of the sign to match the cream front, add nice landscaping, and light the sign. We will also be hanging changeable boards with our worship service times. All of this is planned and part of our budget.
