

## Message from Pastor Kim

### What If....The News is Good?

A good friend recently told me the story of a trip she took with her family when she was ten years old, a long awaited vacation to Niagara Falls. At that time, there was a cable car that took visitors out over the water so they could see the falls close up. Her parents and older sister were eager for a closer look at the falls, so they elected to take the cable car ride. My friend, though, stayed behind because she was too afraid. She was troubled by the "what-ifs": What if the ride made her so sick she couldn't even see the falls? What if the cable didn't hold? What if the cable car crashed and tumbled into the falls, leaving her all alone in the world with her two-year old brother, who was back home in Ohio with a relative? When the rest of the family returned, they talked about how beautiful and awesome the experience was...to see the dramatic falls close up and to even feel the spray of water on your face. Decades later, she still remembers the disappointing feeling of having missed the falls close-up because of her fear of the "what-ifs."

Her story resonates with me as I remember my own experiences of holding back because of "what-ifs." I suspect it will resonate with many of you as well. Although there may be some daredevils among us who plunge into things without stopping to contemplate fears and what-ifs, my experience is that many of us hold back out of some fear of the what-ifs:

What if I reach out to someone and get rejected?  
What if my new project is a failure?  
What if my medical test shows a serious illness?  
What if the economy collapses?  
What if people don't understand me?  
What if my child can't find her way in life?

## Message from Pastor Kim (continued)

Of course any of these things might happen; we can't deny that some of them are a possibility. However, the what-ifs will rule the day if we let them. Perhaps there is a way to turn them around and let ourselves imagine possibilities rather than problems.

We are all familiar with the Biblical events that we recall during Holy Week and as a central part of our faith: the events in the life of Jesus that led to the trial, to the last supper, to the cross, to the empty tomb, and beyond. Imagine what it was like for that first band of disciples as they began to sense that the tide was turning against Jesus and them. What were their what-ifs? Perhaps they were wondering:

What if the crowds turn against Jesus?  
 What if we are taken away because of our association with him?  
 What if we trusted him too blindly?  
 What if Jesus can't hold up under this kind of intense pressure?

In the disciples' limited wisdom and the context of their lives up to that point, they could not have even begun to imagine what actually came to pass: that Pilate, despite his own misgivings, would give in to the angry mob and order the death of Jesus on the cross. And so as the disciples confronted something far worse than even they had imagined, an amazing thing happened which turned their lives, our lives, and the direction of the world around: God rolled away the stone of their fearful what-ifs and offered a different kind of possibility.

What if...life conquers death?  
 What if...Jesus is alive?  
 What if...your sins are forgiven and you can begin again?  
 What if...God's love is every bit as strong as God said it was going to be?  
 What if...the news is good!!!

In this upcoming Easter season, this holy season of possibilities, we receive the awesome news that the stone of death has been rolled away. It is now up to us to roll away the stone of our fears and embrace the life-changing and transforming gift of God's love and forgiveness.

A plan was presented to replace our present office copier with one leased through Toshiba. The present machine is costing \$450 per month with 13 months left on the lease. Toshiba offered a deal that would absorb the cost to CT Business Services and it would be factored into the monthly cost of payment to them. The payments would be \$226.00 and remain at this rate for the life of the lease without any increase adjustments. This proposal will be proposed at the council meeting.

The notification letter to the congregation regarding the proposal on the new roof was discussed and agreed would be sent out the week of the 14<sup>th</sup>.

A new church sign was not discussed because of lack of illustrations.

Pastor Kim brought up the timeline of donations brought in for the May 9 clothing drive. No dates were confirmed.

We have one **Sunday** car wash this month from 12 – 4 pm on April 19<sup>th</sup>.




**ASP BOTTLE AND CAN DRIVE**

*There will be no Sunday school on Easter, April 5<sup>th</sup> and April 12<sup>th</sup>.*




## Confirmation Update

This year's Confirmation class has been meeting since October. The Confirmation process in the United Methodist Church gives young people the opportunity to affirm the faith into which they were baptized. Confirmation also strives to make our youth aware of how God has been and is active in their lives, and helps underscore the importance of a connection and place in the body of Christ, through the church.

Over the course of the year, confirmands study basic Christian concepts such as creation, sin and redemption. They consider what it means to be made new in Christ and empowered by the Holy Spirit. They learn about God's grace and salvation. They also study the place of the sacraments in the life of the church. In addition to all of that, they also receive teachings about the unique history and traditions of United Methodism.

This year's Confirmation class includes: Jade Cain, Justin Goodwin, Nathaniel and Peter Hornik, and Musa Masood. Confirmation Sunday is May 31st. On that Sunday, the Confirmation class will be leading the worship along with their Confirmation teacher, Pastor Kim.

### Chancel Choir and Impulse Choir.


Choose EITHER or BOTH!

## Special UMC Mission



Did you know that since 2000 the rate of malaria deaths in Africa has been cut from one million a year to 500,000? This has been accomplished through a worldwide campaign to eradicate this disease. Several organizations have banded together with the goal of reducing malaria deaths to zero. These organizations include, among others, The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation and the United Methodist Church.

The UMC calls its campaign “Imagine No Malaria” and has a goal of raising \$75 million by the end of 2016. The New York Annual Conference share of this goal is \$1.2 million and we have already raised nearly half.

Bishop Jane Middleton is asking each congregation to do its part to help realize our goal of eradicating malaria. She is asking each congregation to contribute \$10 per person by April 25, which is World Malaria Day.

On **Sunday, April 19**, we will receive a collection for this purpose. Please come prepared to make your donation. Our Confirmation Class will make a brief presentation on the importance of this campaign, after which the class will take up an offering. Our offering will then be presented to the Annual Conference with a celebration at the Conference session in June.

This is a time to give generously. The lives of precious women, men, and children depend on it. Please plan to be a part of this incredible opportunity to help defeat this deadly disease.

## APPALACHIA SERVICE PROJECT

For the Danbury United Methodist Church, Appalachia Service Project is a ministry that provides the high school aged youth from the Danbury area an opportunity to volunteer a week of their summer, repairing the homes of low-income families in Central Appalachia. We've done work such as; repairing rotted trailer floors, replacing roofs, adding rooms so that children are allowed to stay with their family by the authorities, added safe entrance and egress, installed insulation, etc. We like to say that the goal of ASP is to make homes "warmer, safer and drier" for needy families.

While that is true, for the adults involved in ASP, in addition to helping those families it has also been a chance to spend time working together, getting to know each other a little better and getting to know the kids from our church as well as many other kids. For the youth, it is a chance to help others, to become confident with new skills (not all of which are related to home repair), to see a very different life style, and to get to know kids they would likely never have gotten to know.

It has been my hope that by giving the youth involved in ASP a chance to serve others, and by setting an example for them, we might create in them a lifetime desire to help others.

If you are interested in taking part there are a couple ways to do so. First, you are welcome to join us on the trip, we typically travel to Appalachia in late June or early July, this year our trip will be from Saturday, June 27<sup>th</sup> through Sunday, July 5<sup>th</sup>. There is a list of various dates for training, orientations, etc. on our church website under Appalachia Service Project ([danburymethodist/asp](http://danburymethodist/asp)). No building or repair experience is necessary. Adult volunteers are still very much needed. However, if you aren't willing to sleep on an air mattress for a week or physical work is not in the cards there are other ways to help. Coordinating or helping to organize activities, help with fund raising, and various administrative activities all need to be done. If this is something you might be interested in lending a hand with, there is work to be done. Our planning committee (usually) meets the third Wednesday of each month at 7 PM in room 3 of the Danbury UMC. There are several folks from our church that help with the year round planning as well as people from St. James Episcopal church and the King Street Congregational church.

### Bike and Build


