

Message from Pastor Kim

Confirmation: A Journey in Faith

On Sunday, May 17, four youth (three 8th graders and one 10th grader) will be confirmed as Christians at our 10:30 a.m. worship service. Since Danbury UMC has not had a Confirmation class in some years, I wanted to say a word about what Confirmation means. When these young persons were baptized, their parents took a vow to do everything in their power to raise their children in the Christian faith. On May 17, they will make a public commitment to embrace Christianity for themselves. Although the Confirmation service will follow a year during which the Confirmands studied scripture, the basis for Christianity, and the foundation of the United Methodist Church, the truth is that they have been preparing for this moment since they were small children. They have attended Sunday school and worship at our church for years; thus, they grew up as children of our church. When they stand up and make their commitment to serve Jesus Christ, I would anticipate that it would be a moment of great pride for our entire church family, who actively participated in their Christian upbringing.

The Confirmation students were required to complete a brief project at the end of the year. Most chose to write an essay on their faith journey. As we discussed this in class, I was impressed with how free they felt to ask questions and to admit that there were many things about the Christian journey they still weren't sure about. One student ended his essay by saying, "I still have so many questions." And that is as it should be. Confirmation is intended to be the beginning, and not the end, of their faith walk. Their questions should be a reminder to all of us that our Christian journey is about feeling free to ask questions and not assuming that we have or should know all the answers.

As I told the class, "God never minds us asking questions." Asking questions of God, within the context of a faith community, is how we grow and mature in our faith. I really liked it when one of the Confirmands said: "I can safely say my faith journey has just begun; on the road to becoming a firm believer, I'm looking forward to everything I have left to learn."

Message from Pastor Kim (continued)

As four youth from our church family make their public commitment to serve Jesus Christ, I hope and pray that each one of you will see this year's Confirmation Service on May 17 as an opportunity to renew your own faith commitment to our Lord Jesus Christ; to reflect on and ask any questions that arise for you in your faith journey; and to understand that wherever you are in your life, that you will open your heart in new ways to the spiritual invitation for a closer walk with God and with all who are members of the body of Christ.

Though I sent an email through our email contact list about this matter, I realize not everyone gets email. I wanted to be sure that everyone has gotten the information that after a recent consultation with an orthopedic surgeon, I learned that I will need a joint replacement on my left knee. The surgery will take place on May 28 at the Hospital for Special Surgery (an orthopedic hospital) in New York City. It is anticipated that I will be away from work approximately 4 to 5 weeks. I have already let our District Superintendent know of the situation. In addition, I have arranged for Rev Jim Stinson to preach during the Sundays I will be out. I am grateful for his graciousness in being willing to continue to serve. I will be working with the SPR committee at our May meeting to address any other logistical concerns. In advance, I will be grateful for your prayers during the time of my surgery and recovery.




Financial Report

Q1 2015 Financial Update

Danbury UMC closed out Q1 2015 with income of \$42.8K and expenses of \$56.4K. This represents a \$2.7K decline in year-to-year income and \$300 decline in expenses. Q1 always has the highest expenses with heat/electric and plowing cost the highest in this quarter so it is not unusual to have much higher expenses than income in Q1. The chart below shows this year to year comparison for Q1. In addition, we missed one Sunday due to weather this year which also has had some impact on income.



So, how much did we save by having services down stairs this year? It has proven very difficult to know that for sure since the temperatures and weather have significant impact to electric bills and the biggest factor is the weather during Sunday morning. We do know that the temperatures were much colder this year with the month of February over 10 degrees colder on average than last year. Even with this we saved \$3.2K year to year on electric in Q1 as the chart below shows. Accounting for the colder winter I believe (not scientific here...) the real savings are closer to \$5K which is a very significant saving.

Trustees April Report

Larry Bornemeier and Don Lombardo met with the Union Savings Bank concerning the final details of the loan for the roof replacement. The bank agreed that as the loan is reduced by a like amount of the CD's held for collateral would be available. Also, throughout the life of the loan, the CD's will still be subject to our discretion regarding the terms of maturity.

The time between giving Barrett Roofing the down payment and start of the job will be minimal, preferably in May.

Approximately \$8300 has been received toward the new roof and \$1,000 in future pledges received.

Kevin O'Shea mentioned that current four vent fans in the roof should be confirmed to be in working order by us as the project commences. Repair expenses should be minimal, estimated at \$200 average per fan.

The storage units we were to receive at no cost are still in use by the company and will not be available for the foreseeable future.

The new exterior Church doors will be painted as the weather warms up including the lower level doors.

A general cleanup of the grounds had to be rescheduled for 9 a.m., Saturday May 9th.

The parsonage needs include power washing the patio.

NOTE: The next Trustees Meeting has been rescheduled for Tuesday May 12 rather than the normal schedule of May 6th.



Fund Raising Breakfast for Renewal House.



Please join me for breakfast at WCSU Westside Campus for Renewal House, from 7:30am to 9am. This is the major fund raiser for Renewal House. Renewal House is a program for folks that are 58+ and homeless or in danger of being homeless. We offer them a place to stay and help them with programs, that they need to recapture their independence. Some need help getting medical care, get on waiting lists for housing, learning to balance a check book, these are a few of the things that help is needed with. Renewal House has a 93% success rate. When folks "graduate" from the program, Renewal House is still there to help along the way.

Here is an idea of where and how much money is spent on: one hour of individual counseling \$25; two weeks of case management service \$60; one month of meals for a resident \$125 and for one month of shelter \$275.
